



During the month of March MVPD responded/handled a total of 6,164 calls/incidents. 4,904 House Watch checks were conducted. 450 traffic stops were initiated with 482 citations being issued for 816 violations. (Note: 10 Assists in Hedwig, 84 in Houston, 1 in Spring Valley and 1 in Hillshire)

#### Follow-up on Previous Month Items/Requests from Commission

- Budget Committee met on March 21, 2022, and explored several budget options. The committee agreed that the members would speak with their respective councils and mayors for additional guidance and direction.
- Chief Schultz contacted TMRS and received information on options and costs of making changes to the MVPD TMRS plan.
- Victoria calculated the costs to hire, train and equip a fulltime Animal Control Officer.
- Chief Schultz obtained information on how to create an animal control officer position from TML and reviewed the appropriate state statutes.
- Commissioner Huguenard was provided information on the city ordinances that are most often in conflict with each other due to differences in language, times and limitations.

#### Personnel Changes/Issues/Updates

- The department remains down two sworn positions.
- Officer Valdez moved to the other dayshift squad and Officers Burleson and Vasquez moved to dayshift from nightshift due to Officers Eckerfield and Williford being released from Field Training.

#### Major/Significant Events

- On March 9, 2022, officers stopped a vehicle after being notified of a stolen license plate on the SUV. A check of the VIN Number found the vehicle to also be stolen. A search of the vehicle located over 100 altered/fraudulent credit cards. The suspect was arrested.
- On March 11, 2022, officers located and stopped a vehicle that hit on the ALPR system. The vehicle was on the hotlist entered by HPD. Officers located stolen credit cards and fraudulent documents inside of the vehicle. The suspect was wanted by HPD for stealing vehicles and boats. One victim was a village resident. HPD detectives responded and took possession of the suspect, evidence and vehicle.
- On March 21<sup>st</sup> MVPD participated in a Community Conversation on Crime event that was held at St. Francis Church. The event was attended by just over 100 people.
- On March 22, 2022, MVPD executive staff met with Harris County DA K. Ogg and HFSC Dr. Stout and participated in discussions on the negative impact that HB1325 is having on case adjudication and the suppression of evidence.

#### Status Update on any Major Projects

- The area in front of the MVPD is being prepared for the installation of the Police Officers Monument. A dedication is being planned for May 21, 2022.
- Commissioner Rosenbaum updated the 2023-2028 MVPD Capital Projects Summary and cost estimates.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 22-574**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS EXTENDING A PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY AND EXTENDING A STATE OF DISASTER DUE TO THE OUTBREAK OF COVID-19; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

\* \* \* \* \* \*

**WHEREAS**, Greg Abbott, Governor of the State of Texas, entered a declaration of disaster on March 13, 2020 as a result of the outbreak of the COVID-19 virus; and

WHEREAS, Harris County Judge, Lina Hidalgo, entered a stay home, work safe order for all of Harris County on March 24, 2020 to last until April 3, 2020, due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 virus; and

**WHEREAS**, on March 31, 2020, Judge Hidalgo extended the stay home, work safe order until April 30, 2020 and has continued orders to date; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council of the City of Bunker Hill Village, Texas issued a disaster declaration on March 24, 2020 and approved on April 21, 2020, May 19, 2020, June 16, 2020, August 18, 2020, September 15, 2020, October 20, 2020, November 17, 2020, January 19, 2021, February 22, 2021, March 23, 2021, April 20, 2021, May 18, 2021, June 15, 2021, August 17, 2021, September 21, 2021, October 19, 2021, November 16, 2021, January 18, 2022, February 15, 2022 and March 8, 2022 an extension to the order; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council of the City of Bunker Hill Village, Texas will continue to follow the Governor's direction for the extension of this emergency; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council of the City of Bunker Hill Village, Texas finds it to be in the best interest of the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens to extend this declaration of disaster for an additional forty-five (45) days; and

WHEREAS, by this Declaration, the City Council declares all rules and regulations that may inhibit or prevent prompt response to this threat suspended for the duration of the incident; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the authority granted to the Mayor under the Texas Disaster Act, the Mayor, with the consent of Council authorizes the use of all available resources of state government and political subdivisions to assist in the City's response to this situation; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BUNKER HILL VILLAGE, TEXAS:

**Section 1.** The facts and matters contained in the preamble to this ordinance are

hereby found to be true and correct.

- <u>Section 2</u>. **Extension of Local State of Disaster.** That the local state of disaster and public health emergency previously declared for the City of Bunker Hill Village pursuant to §418.108 of the Texas Disaster Act is hereby extended for 45 days from the date of this ordinance or unless terminated or modified by earlier ordinance of the City.
- Section 3. Publicity and Filing. Pursuant to §418.108(c) of the Texas Disaster Act, this declaration of a local state of disaster due to this public health emergency shall be given prompt and general publicity and shall be filed promptly with the City Secretary.
- Section 4. Activation of the City Emergency Management Plan. Pursuant to §418.108(d) of the Texas Disaster Act, this declaration of a local state of disaster due to this public health emergency activates the City of Bunker Hill Village Emergency Management Plan.
- Section 5. Temporary Housing and Emergency Shelter. Pursuant to §418.020(d) of the Texas Disaster Act, this declaration authorizes the City to: (1) temporarily or permanently acquire by lease, purchase, or other means sites required for temporary housing units or emergency shelters for disaster victims; and (2) enter into arrangements necessary to prepare or equip the sites for installation and use of temporary housing units or emergency shelters, including arrangements necessary for the transportation and purchase of temporary housing units or emergency shelters.
- Section 6. In the event any clause phrase, provision, sentence, or part of this Ordinance or the application of the same to any person or circumstances shall for any reason be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect, impair, or invalidate this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provision hereof other than the part declared to be invalid or unconstitutional; and the City Council of the City of Bunker Hill Village, Texas, declares that it would have passed each and every part of the same notwithstanding the omission of any such part thus declared to be invalid or unconstitutional, whether there be one or more parts.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its approval.







#### **Executive Summary**

The City has received two requests from CenterPoint regarding increasing utility rates. One is for CenterPoint Gas and the other for CenterPoint Electric. The City, along with approximately 40 other cities served by CenterPoint ("CenterPoint" or "Company") is a member of the Gulf Coast Coalition of Cities ("GCCC"). The coalition has been in existence since the early 1990s. GCCC has been the primary public interest advocate before the Public Utility Commission, the Courts, and the Legislature on utility regulation matters for over 20 years.

The legal counsel for the GCCC is recommending all cities take action on theses request as outlined on the attached resolutions. The following has been provided by the GCCC.

#### CenterPoint Gas:

The week of February 28, 2022, CenterPoint Gas made Interim Rate Adjustment or "GRIP" filings with the cities in their Houston and Texas Coast divisions. For cities in the Houston Division, the Company is seeking recovery of \$193,152,387 in invested capital. This compares to \$153,689,801 last year, \$157,664,708 in 2020, \$99,461,495 in 2019 and \$112,238,512 in 2018.

The current filing will increase rates to residential customers by \$1.36 per month. This will increase the current residential customer charge from \$18.38 to \$19.74 per month. Last year the increase was \$.99 per month.

For cities in the Texas Coast Division, the Company is seeking recovery of \$51,135,035 in invested capital. This compares to \$45,065,113 last year, \$37,937,732 in 2020, \$46,935,293 in 2019 and \$31,889,184 in 2018. The current filing will increase rates to residential customers by \$1.32 per month. This will increase the current residential customer charge from \$18.62 to \$19.94 per month. Last year the increase was \$.88 per month.

Increases in both divisions are currently scheduled to go into effect on May 2, 2022.

Under the GRIP statute, cities may not challenge the Company's request. The only action cities may take is to suspend the effective date of the rate increase by 45 days.

#### CenterPoint Electric:

On April 5, 2022, CenterPoint filed an Application for Approval to Amend its Distribution Cost Recovery Factor ("DCRF") Pursuant to 16 Tex. Admin. Code § 25.243 to Increase Distribution Rates with each of the cities in their service area.

In the filing, the Company is proposing an adjustment to include additional distribution invested capital placed in service from January 1, 2019 to December 31, 2021. As a result of that adjustment, the Company is proposing a Total DCRF Revenue Requirement of \$198,422,017 to be effective on September 1, 2022. The resulting Total DCRF Revenue Requirement sought by the Company constitutes a \$145,680,810 increase to the currently approved total distribution revenue requirement that is scheduled to go into effect on September 1, 2022.

GCCC engaged the services of a consultant, Mr. Karl Nalepa, to review the Company's filing. GCCC's attorney recommends that all GCCC members adopt the Resolution denying the rate change.

Once the Resolution is adopted, CenterPoint will have 30 days to appeal the decision to the Public Utility Commission where the appeal will be consolidated with CenterPoint's filing for the environs and those cities that have relinquished their original jurisdiction currently pending at the Commission.

Purpose of the Resolution: The purpose of the Resolution is to deny the DCRF application proposed by CenterPoint.

Explanation of "Be It Resolved" Paragraphs: 1. This paragraph finds that the Company's application is unreasonable and should be denied. 2. This section states that the Company's current rates shall not be changed. 3. The Company will reimburse the cities for their reasonable rate case expenses. Legal counsel and consultants approved by the Cities will submit monthly invoices that will be forwarded to CenterPoint for reimbursement. 4. This section recites that the Resolution was passed at a meeting that was open to the public and that the consideration of the Resolution was properly noticed. 5. This section provides CenterPoint and counsel for the cities will be notified of the City's action by sending a copy of the approved and signed Resolution to counsel

Both Resolutions are recommended for approval.

WHEREAS, on or about April 5, 2022 CenterPoint filed with the City an Application for Approval to Amend its Distribution Cost Recovery Factor ("DCRF") Pursuant to 16 Tex. Admin. Code § 25.243 seeking Total DCRF Revenue Requirement of \$198,422,017 to be effective on September 1, 2022; and

WHEREAS, all electric utility customers residing in the City will be impacted by this ratemaking proceeding if it is granted; and

WHEREAS, GCCC is coordinating its review of CenterPoint's DCRF filing with designated attorneys and consultants to resolve issues in the Company's application; and

WHEREAS, the GCCC's members and attorneys recommend that GCCC members deny the DCRF.

#### **Executive Summary**

The City of Bunker Hill Village's 2021 and 2022 Capital Improvements Plan includes reconstruction of the pavement and drainage infrastructure for Chapel Belle and a segment of Tamerlaine. This project was identified as one of the City's priority pavement projects as part of the City's Pavement Assessment Project conducted in 2015. The construction contract was approved in January 2022 and the project is going very well.

Change Order No. 2 is submitted for Council approval which is a net decrease to the contract in the amount of \$5,176.61. This change is the result of a required field modification to one of the stormwater inlets. The plans originally specified a concrete precast inlet and this was changed to a field constructed inlet. The savings will be credited to the contingency fund for the project.

For Council Information: Change Order No. 1 was approved at the January Council Meeting which added \$20,512.17 in work by this Contractor for the construction of the traffic barrier at the intersection of Taylorcrest Road and Bunker Hill Road. This work is now complete and was funded out of the City's Maintenance and Operations Account.

Staff recommends approval for Change Order No. 2.

#### INFORMATION REQUIRED

The 36" RCP seems to be in conflict with the existing subgrade and 6" pavement at Sta 3+02. The attach sketch show our field elevations.

Addtionally.

The elevation of the 36" RCP is in conflict the top structure of the manhole. The top of the RCP would be above the thinwall knockout section by 6inches.

Please advise us with the necessary elevations/design to ensure that the RCP is not in conflict with proposed pavement and manhole.

#### **RESPONSE:**

The proposed 36" RCP will be in conflict with the sub-grade. Attached are revised plans with revisions to the roadway profile. The revisions allow a minimum of 6" concrete pavement cover over the proposed pipe.

Tongue and groove pipe, opposed to bell and spigot pipe is recommended for locations where the proposed pipe is in conflict with the propose pavement thickness. Provide a minimum 6" concrete cover over all proposed pipes.

Due to the shallow flow lines at Station 3+02, a cast in place inlet should be used. Please provide a change order request for the additional cost.

The proposed manhole at Station 1+40.83 is a 6' diameter manhole, the manhole should not have more than a couple inches of standing water. If the 36" does not fit within the knockout panel, the manhole will need to be adjusted to fit, per manufacturer's recommendations.
